There were songs accompanied by Peter Churchill, a total of a dozen scenes performed by costumed characters as well as a lurking Roman soldier seeking the way to Metchley Fort via Icknield Street , while under attack from an Ancient Briton.



Balsall Heath Heritage Walk



We were delighted to offer this walk on Sept 11th as part of Birmingham Heritage Week. Our route started at Myrtle Cottage, believed to date from the late eighteenth century and then took us to Malvern Street to visit Balsall Heath City Farm, now 42 years old. Then in Runcorn Road we met Daniel Peters, a farmer who became a Railway Contractor, who gave his name to the house there. After that we returned to the Moseley Road to walk past the Moseley and Balsall Heath Institute before having a guided tour of the Creation Climbing Centre and Skatepark, which was previously the Tram Depot, opened in 1907 with room for 77 electric trams.



Next we were off to Cromer Road, past Payne's old HQ to reach Tindal Street , past the lovely old school building and Balsall Heath's Carbon Neutral ECO House. Here we were treated to a brief explanation of its key features, by John Christophers, the architect who designed it. Then we walked on, viewing John Bowen's yard from the pocket park before entering the famous Old Moseley Arms. Edward Road Police station was our next stop.

The glorious buildings on the Moseley Road were at the end of the walk. The Baths were, alas, still shrouded with scaffolding but at the Library we were addressed by a Librarian from times past who told us of the austere rules and regulations which were once enforced.

Attention was given to the Moseley Community Hub (old Art School) before we finished the walk back at The Old Print Works, where Mr. Butcher himself told us about his factory which was here from 1909 for about 100 years.

Thank you to all participants who came along to walk the walk with us and who made the two sessions most enjoyable.

Thanks also to the Commonwealth Games Legacy Fund who awarded us a grant for this trail. The printed version will be produced this autumn.


The Family and Local History Fair Held at The MAC on Sept 15th

Benjamin Orange Grimmett's grave. An Appeal.
