#### Watsons Florists 365 Ladypool Rd.

This article is the result of a contact made at the Local History Fair in September this year. We were approached by the great-grandson of Margaret Watson who started the Florist's shop in about 1902. In the photo below she is the lady standing on the right beside the greenhouse which was in the back garden. Presumably, she sold flowers which she had grown herself

The shop was on the stretch of the road between Brighton Rd and Newport Rd.



Margaret died in 1951 and her son Archibald took over the business. He had married Winifred Dancocks in 1924 and the photo below show her at work behind the bar at the Brighton Hotel, on the corner of Brighton Rd.

### Moseley Road Vaths Refurbishment Apdate December 2022







Following the announcement of further funds for the continuation of the refurbishment of the Moseley Road Baths, we saw the building go undercover in April this year (top photo) to facilitate work on the façade of the


building, protecting the brickwork and cleaning of the decorative Terracotta. With the covers lifted we can see the result of the work done so far.

The Intricate and beautiful design of the Edwardian Terracotta facia can now be seen in all its glory. We noted when taking these photographs that there are several small panes of glass that are still in need of repair. Our inquiries into this led to us finding out that the windows are not part of the stages of refurbishment so far. This is expected to be addressed in a future phase of conservation. J.F.

#### Balsall Heath Pubs With No Beer

The landscape of Balsall Heath has suffered the loss of yet another pub. The Eagle of Mary St B12 is no more. While the building is still there at No 189 &191, it no longer looks like a pub, has no bar, does not serve beer, and never will again. Researching this fact has made us fully aware of the extent to which this has happened across the district. So much so, a short-run series of articles on the subject will follow in future issues of the Gazette. We will also be presenting a talk at our meeting on January 26<sup>th</sup>.

This subject lends itself to illustration, as the 'then and now' photographs of the buildings involved tell the story in each case so vividly. Our comments alongside these photos will try to reflect something of the history of the building(s) and the people involved with them. In the main, this will not cover pubs where the building has gone altogether.





The Book 'Time Please! – A look back at Birmingham's Pubs', by Andrew Maxam, features the photo on the left here as "The Eagle c 1947", and "This beer house was a new purchase for M & B back in 1939 and was granted a full license in 1962. The pub's nickname is Snackers". The 2<sup>nd</sup> photo (right) shows the pub decked out as Snackers, likely a 50s image with its new windows and doors. In previous issues of the Gazette (Jan & Aug 2019) we have been able to explain the reason for the *Snackers*' nickname, the essence of which is due to Tram crews calling there for their lunch to be eaten at the terminus at the top of Mary Street.

The building today, (photos May 2022). That is a bedroom seen through the window at the bottom left. There is no bay window with decorated glass.

This can be shrugged off as a minor change in a quiet urban landscape. The Eagle, given its location just up the street from the crossroads of Mary St and Edward Rd and the undeniable presence of the Coach & Horses building standing proud on the corner, would not have even been cited by people giving directions by pub locations.

But this does reflect the enormous changes to the urban landscape. In his foreword for the book Time Please, Carl Chinn explains "[ -- ] we are in danger of losing one of its most important elements – its pubs, especially its back-street pubs. [ -- ] Pubs were more than a place to drink. They were social, sporting, and neighbourhood centres. [ -- ] Drawing their regulars from a small area, back-street pubs were embedded within their neighbourhoods and just as the local folk depended upon the pubs for a major facility so too did the pubs depend upon the people of the

neighbourhood."

There are a number of buildings that were once well-attended pubs in our area. We shall be covering a good number of them in future issues of the Gazette. We are for instance not finished with the Eagle as we will be reporting people's memories as customers. Just some of the pubs to be covered in the series are the New Inn, the Victoria (Runcorn), the Railway, Clifton (Clifton Rd) the Crown (St Paul's Rd / Hereford).
