The Society of course would not exist without you, its members, so I wish to give you my grateful thanks and hope that you will continue to support and attend the Society's monthly meetings and other events.


The Lost Children Project



The Lost Children Project aims to raise awareness of the work of the Middlemore Homes which emigrated over 5000 children from Birmingham to Canada but also Australia, between 1873 & 1954. The children were placed with farmers in the backwoods until 1932 and after that sent to Fairbridge Farm Schools.

The Home Child

In April this year there was the Launch of "The Home Child", a novel in verse by Liz Berry, the story of Eliza Showell, a Middlemore Child and Great Aunt to Liz herself.



The Launch attracted an audience of over

100 people. After an introductory discussion, Liz Berry read a selection of poems from her book and then there were questions from the audience which were responded to by Liz herself and Val Hart from our Society. The Lost Children touring Exhibition was also on display and received a lot of attention. The original Homes were in St Luke's Road, Highgate, and moved to Selly Oak in 1929. In July, 2022 the Blue Plaque in St Luke's Road, Highgate was launched. This was achieved in partnership with The Civic Trust and Barratt Homes, who developed the site. It is surrounded by maple trees as a homage to Canada.




The Society gained grants from the Commonwealth Games Celebrating Communities Fund for a touring exhibition on pop-up banners also partly funded by a grant from the Midland Ancestors Kemp Legacy Fund. This toured Balsall Heath and Highgate before moving to The Back to Backs in Hurst Street where it stayed from July to October for Birmingham Heritage Week 2022 and Val Hart gave a talk at St Martins in the Bullring.

The Birmingham History Theatre Company also performed a play, "The Lost Children" at the Midlands Arts Centre and the Blue Orange Theatre, in July. The performances won excellent reviews.

Events and Trips

This year we ran stalls at Balsall Heath Carnival, the Moseley Fair and the Birmingham Lives Local History Fair, all of which went well. In July we enjoyed a trip out to The Police Museum at the Lock Up in Steelhouse Lane and there was also a Brandwood Cemetery Trail in August and September, "Every Grave Has a Story," revealing the lives of seven of Balsall Heath's residents. Meanwhile The book, "The Lost Children" continued to sell well and enquiries from relatives flowed in. We have been able to undertake some research for families, which has been very pleasing.




One of the people who

contacted us was a relative of Benjamin Grimmett, one of the Lost Children who was returned to England to live at Monyhull Colony. His grave has now been restored, thanks to donations from his relative and readers of the Gazette.

Balsall Heath Heritage Trail, September 2022
