

This was a splendid occasion held on September 21st. Mick Turner himself flew over from Ireland specially for the event and received a Thank You card from Balsall Heath as well as heartfelt applause.

He made a short speech, recalling the time he spent in the neighbourhood taking photographs and contributing to the Balsall Heathan newspaper.



Over sixty people came along to share memories and look at the displays. They included many who lived ,worked and volunteered here in the past as well as current local residents. We were particularly pleased to welcome Mrs Kapasi from the Bohra community.



Another celebrity guest was Gill Atkinson, Dick's widow, who travelled from the Wirral to join us, which was also very much appreciated. In 1968 in the old St Paul's church hall she started a preschool playgroup which later became St Paul's Nursery, still flourishing today, now in Malvern St.



Other notable attendees were Ron Ford, a long term resident, who for many years was a hard working volunteer and a lynch pin of the Carnival; Pat Johnson who, with Albert, ran the local 59th Birmingham Scouts group, as well as being a key member of the Local History Society since 1980; Paul Stocking, who was one of the first teachers at St Paul's School from 1975; Joe Holyoak; Polly Feather, Joy Ashworth; and many more.

The hall was filled with displays which were much enjoyed




Patrick Baird, our Chair, started the event with introductions and Val Hart gave a brief description of the aims of the project. Then came Pat Wing, ex Police, who worked with Dick in the 1990s and who is currently Chair of St Paul's Trust. He reflected on the prostitution which was so much a part of the area's story, and how it was ended.

Dr Steve Ball followed with an entertaining account of his early career as Charlie the Clown in Balsall Heath which led to the foundation of the Language Alive Theatre in Education Company and a glittering personal career.

After that Richard Albutt spoke, describing how he became involved in St Paul's Community Theatre which was creating plays and drama events based on local history in the 1980s and 90s. The current Birmingham History Theatre grew from these roots. The description of his journey from slightly interested bystander to Director struck a chord with many people in the room who had found themselves drawn in as volunteers.

Many people took part in the walking trail which toured the area around Clifton Road and St Paul's Road, where so much changed in the 1980s and 90s.


MOSELEY ROAD METHODIST CHURCH – Part 3


Part 2 of the history of Moseley Road Methodist Church appeared in the July edition of the Gazette. That article took the story up to the time of its Diamond Jubilee in 1932. It was apparent that at that time there was great hope for the Church and its future. Sadly, those hopes and dreams were shattered on the night of Saturday October 26th 1940 when the Moseley Road building was severely damaged by a bomb and the Sunday School buildings at the rear were destroyed.

On the following morning, some thought that was the end for the Moseley Road church, but others pulled together and by the afternoon a temporary chapel had been created. However, a more permanent solution was needed. Plans were made for the damaged church to be demolished and for a new church to be built. Just over nine years since the bombing, the Foundation Stones of the new church were laid. A ceremony was held on November 12th 1949. The attendees assembled at the entrance to the temporary church in Lime Grove and walked in procession to the site. The Foundation Stones were laid by the following:- Miss Moon, who was the oldest member of the congregation and formerly a member of the Cherry Street Church.

Mr F.G. Ratcliff J. P. of Dorridge, who was a great nephew of Lt. Col. Ratcliff, who laid one of the original foundation stones.






Miss Moon laying the Foundation Stone.
